Dear Trinity,

On June 20th, we celebrated Father's Day, taking time to recognize and celebrate those men who take the big step in maturity required to be called, "Dad." Being a father does not just mean becoming a biological parent. Fatherhood is about a man taking responsibility for the care of his children: physically, mentally, spiritually. It is a life of service for the sake of the children entrusted to him. It's not an easy proposition!

Recently, fatherhood has fallen on hard times. A 2008 survey of over 1500 mothers 18 years old and older showed that 93% believed there is a fatherhood crisis in America. Current census numbers show that over 25 million children today live without a father. And it shows in our kids: 71% of high school drop-outs have minimal or no father involvement and are more likely to skip school or be expelled. Fatherless boys are three times more likely to end up in jail by age 30. In the 25 most deadly school shootings (as of 2016), 75% of the shooters were raised in broken homes. Fatherlessness is a major factor in many of the problems we face.

How do we begin to reverse such a massive problem? There can be no silver bullet; no single variable that will fix it all. Even so, there is a way forward. Where can the new father learn what he should be to his kids when so many dads are simply out of the picture? The answer must be our heavenly Father. The love between the Father and the Son, connected by the Holy Spirit is the model for fathers everywhere. This is most crucial for those who have no model to look to. We saw in 2 Samuel 7 that God models for us the work of a good father: He plans for the wellbeing and maturity of his children (v. 13), He disciplines when needed (v. 14), and most importantly, He stays a source of consistent and steady love throughout their lives (v. 15). These are the things that we need as God's children and our children need them from us. These are the steps to begin to walk in godly fatherhood.



Dads: if you have a father in your life, make sure you tell him how much his presence has meant to you. And if you do not have an earthly dad, you can still be a great one for your kids! Get to know your heavenly Father. He will show the way.

## YOUTH MINISTRY

Mission trips are pivotal to the youth group here at Trinity. With the disappointment of the canceled mission trip to New Orleans in 2020 (due to Covid), and the lingering effects of it in 2021, the youth had to get creative with a mission project this summer. It's times like these when good ideas emerge; why not do mission work right here in our own community? So, we set out looking for organizations that were missional in nature and in need of our help.



We started out at Carver Community Center cleaning, planting, and landscaping the front entrance. Carver Community Center is formally the George Washington Carver Elementary School on Holland St. in Marshall. They are a privately owned Christian community center whose mission is to serve the community. CCC distributed PPE (personal protective equipment) in response to the Covid-19 pandemic and Pampers to mothers of young children. They have meals available for kids during the summer and free coding class for youth. They plan to expand their program to include a museum, after-school programs, and many more activities for both youth and senior citizens.

Trinity Episcopal Youth also worked at Mission Marshall packing food boxes for nursing homes, taking food out to vehicles, organizing shelves, and packing and storing food for those needing assistance at the food pantry. Their friendly faces and energetic personalities were a blessing to the customers of Mission Marshall.



Next, the youth of Trinity Episcopal Church worked at My Friend's House. The youth spent their time cutting tree branches and clearing brush from the newly paved road leading to their thrift store. My Friend's House offers a shower and a washer and dryer for our homeless population. They offer a place to sleep and a warm welcome to those in need. This ministry is supported in part by the well-stocked thrift store that helps take care of the basic needs of the homeless.

Lastly, the youth at Trinity Episcopal Church gave back to the church that loves and supports them by cleaning up the garden area and making it beautiful after a long winter.

The Covid pandemic has caused all of us to make changes in our lives and how we operate as individuals and groups. But, in the midst of all the bad, there is also some good. The Marshall community benefited from a youth group that wasn't able to leave home. Mission work is needed, everywhere, but let us not forget our own neighbors! Mission Week for Trinity Episcopal Youth was such a success and blessing that they plan to do it every year in addition to their out-of-state mission endeavors.

## GIRL SCOUTS

The troop is back and going strong! Troop 7143 is back meeting in person at all levels, working on badges, learning new things, having amazing adventures, and working to improve our community.

We have had a super busy spring with lots of adventures, but working on our aviation badges has certainly brought us to new heights! The girls tackled a multi-week program that included the fundamentals of aviation and the science of flight. They built a variety of gliders and tested wing designs. During this time, the girls delved into the history of women in flight. We then headed to the airport to meet with an aviation professor to discuss the future of aviation and career opportunities in multiple fields that were direct tabs indirectly associated with flight. Later that evening they inspected planes and then took to the skies! For many of the girls, this was their first time in the air. Some of them are definitely hooked!




It is also Metal Season. In Girl Scouts, that means working towards their bronze, silver, or gold awards. These progressive awards teach the girls how to identify projects and issues in their community and help them develop the project management skills to tackle and solve the issues they see around them. Bronze awards are tackled by 4th and 5th graders. In the past, we have done projects at the animal shelter, made supplies to assist the local food bank, or worked in community gardening.

Silver awards are done by 6th - 8th graders and require fifty or more hours of service that produce a sustainable improvement. Both of those awards help prepare the girls for their gold award, which is done during high school. This nationally recognized award provides a project or program to address an issue in a meaningful and sustainable way. It must pass both a local and regional board of review, include media relations, fund raising, project management, budgeting, and project presentation. All these skills help gorge the leaders of tomorrow.

Our scouts at Trinity are currently working on a silver award to help our parish. They are doing a rehab project on the playground. To date, they have power-washed the sidewalks and equipment, restored the two riders, and repainted the bench bases. There is tons of work to follow, and while weather and school have been schedule challenges, even the roadblocks have been important management lessons!

## SPECIAL DAYS IN JULY

### INDEPENDENCE DAY, JULY 4

#### The Collect:

Lord God Almighty, in whose Name the founders of this country won liberty for themselves and for us, and lit the torch of freedom for nations then unborn: Grant that we and all the people of this land may have grace to maintain our liberties in righteousness and peace; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. Amen.

### ST. MARY MAGDALENE, JULY 22

Christian tradition has also honored Mary Magdalene as “Apostle to the Apostles” at least since the era of the Church Fathers. She holds both this title and the title of “equal to the apostles” in the Eastern Church. “Apostle” in Greek means a delegate, ambassador of the Gospel, or a messenger. She is called “Apostle to the Apostles” because she was the first person to witness the Resurrection and share the Gospel. In the Gospel of John, the risen Christ appeared first to Mary Magdalene, and He commanded her to go and tell the disciples (John 20:1-18). She became the first messenger or preacher of the Gospel. In Luke’s account (23:55-24:27), Mary Magdalene and the other women at the empty tomb were reminded that Jesus had taught them that He was to be handed over, crucified, and would rise on the third day. The apostles (or “the eleven” and “the rest”), aside from Peter, did not believe their account. On the road to Emmaus, when Jesus spoke to two disciples, who did not recognize him, He rebuked them for not trusting what the prophets said about the Messiah, and unlike the women, they still did not remember what Jesus taught them. Additionally, Mary Magdalene traveled with Jesus and the twelve and helped financially support His ministry (Luke 8:1-3), and she was present at the crucifixion and went to the tomb to care for Jesus’s body in all four Gospel accounts.



There are several Marys in the Bible, and it is easy to confuse them. Another point of confusion is the commonly held belief that Mary Magdalene was a woman of ill repute or an adulterous woman, a misconception which has been perpetrated in contemporary literature and film. Scripture tells us only that Jesus healed Mary Magdalene of seven demons (Luke 8:1-3 and Mark 16:9). The myth began when Pope Gregory I (d. 604) combined the stories and experiences of multiple Marys into one person in a sermon. He also identified Mary Magdalene with the unnamed adulterous woman (John 7:53-8:11) and the unnamed sinner (Luke 7:36-40), but there is no evidence that either of these women was Mary Magdalene. Around the same time, she was also confused with Mary of Egypt, a reformed prostitute. Conflating Marys has remained part of Christian tradition, but we can learn from all of their unique stories.

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#### The Collect:

Almighty God, whose blessed Son restored Mary Magdalene to health of body and of mind, and called her to be a witness of his resurrection: Mercifully grant that by your grace we may be healed from all our infirmities and know you in the power of his unending life; who with you and the Holy Spirit lives and reigns, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

### ST. JAMES THE APOSTLE, JULY 25

#### The Gospel: Matthew 20:20-28

James was a fisherman called by Jesus, along with his brother, John, out of the boat, where they were with their father, Zebedee, mending their nets. They immediately left their father and their boat to follow Jesus. In the previous chapter, the mother of the sons of Zebedee was present for the conversation when Jesus told Peter that at the renewal of all things the Son of Man will be seated on the throne and his disciples will sit on twelve thrones. Jesus spoke of the rewards for everyone who has left home, family, and work for his name's sake, and adds that "many who are first will be last, and the last will be first." Clearly, James was willing to make great sacrifices to follow Christ.

James' mother was indeed present for this conversation, but she was not present to hear Jesus' words at the very beginning of this passage when he tells his disciples (for the third time) about his upcoming death and resurrection. I wonder if she would have asked Jesus that same question if she knew the cost? Did she think Jesus was talking about earthly thrones? When Jesus confirms that James and John will indeed drink his cup, he is predicting that they will become martyrs. Did James and John really know what that meant? Did they know what they were getting themselves into?

In both of these passages from Matthew, it was Jesus' fate of crucifixion, which was ordered in part for his speaking out and upsetting the power structures. When we preach or speak or write or act prophetically, there will sometimes be consequences, personally and professionally. Unlike the prophets of the Old Testament, such as Jeremiah in today's reading, or the apostles James and John, we probably will not actually risk our lives in order to speak God's word to people. Unless we become missionaries to certain countries, we can reasonably expect that following our calling as Christians will not cost us our actual lives. So, what does it mean to drink from Jesus' cup when most of us will not suffer persecution for our faith?

We can drink from the cup that Jesus drank from in other ways. We can make small sacrifices, even daily, dying to self and putting others' needs above our own. These habits become patterns that shape us and mold us over time. But the pattern is not perfectly linear, and we are not perfect. We are constantly being remade. Jesus calls us to a different way. Throughout the Gospels, Jesus pulls down what is high and lifts up what is low. Jesus commands us to live according to another set of rules, from another kingdom.

Though we may humble ourselves and make all sorts of sacrifices, we do not accomplish worthiness or goodness on our own. We can make sacrifices and serve others and work to become holier, but at the same time, we cannot trust in our own righteousness. Jesus asks are you able to drink from the cup, not will you. Is there a difference? Are we all able? I believe we are empowered by the God who made us in His image and through our baptism. Maybe we are all able, but we are imperfect. That is why, in our Baptismal Covenant, we declare, "I will, with God's help." And it is why we worship in community, form and nurture relationships with other Christians, read our Bibles, pray, and receive Eucharist. In doing so, we receive Christ's presence, grace, and strength to work towards becoming the people God intended us to be.

#### The Collect:

O gracious God, we remember before you today your servant and apostle James, first among the Twelve to suffer martyrdom for the Name of Jesus Christ; and we pray that you will pour out upon the leaders of your Church that spirit of self-denying service by which alone they may have true authority among your people; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

### MARY AND MARTHA OF BETHANY, JULY 29

“Mary and Martha of Bethany are described in the Gospels according to Luke and John as close and well-loved friends of Jesus... Many Christian writers have interpreted Martha and Mary as symbolizing the active and contemplative lives. In most cases, however, they stressed that this division of action and contemplation was not a simple dichotomy. Although most ancient and medieval theologians tended to prioritize the contemplative life, all of them stressed the necessity for the different vocations of both sisters in the church... The Cistercian theologian Aelred of Rievaulx wrote that just as Mary and Martha dwelt as sisters within one house, so also the active and contemplative life should ideally dwell within the same soul.” - Revised Lesser Feasts and Fasts 2018, p 391-392

#### The Collect:

O God, heavenly Father, your Son Jesus Christ enjoyed rest and refreshment in the home of Mary and Martha of Bethany: Give us the will to love you, open our hearts to hear you, and strengthen our hands to serve you in others for his sake; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.


